

# Gertrude Bloodworth in 1896

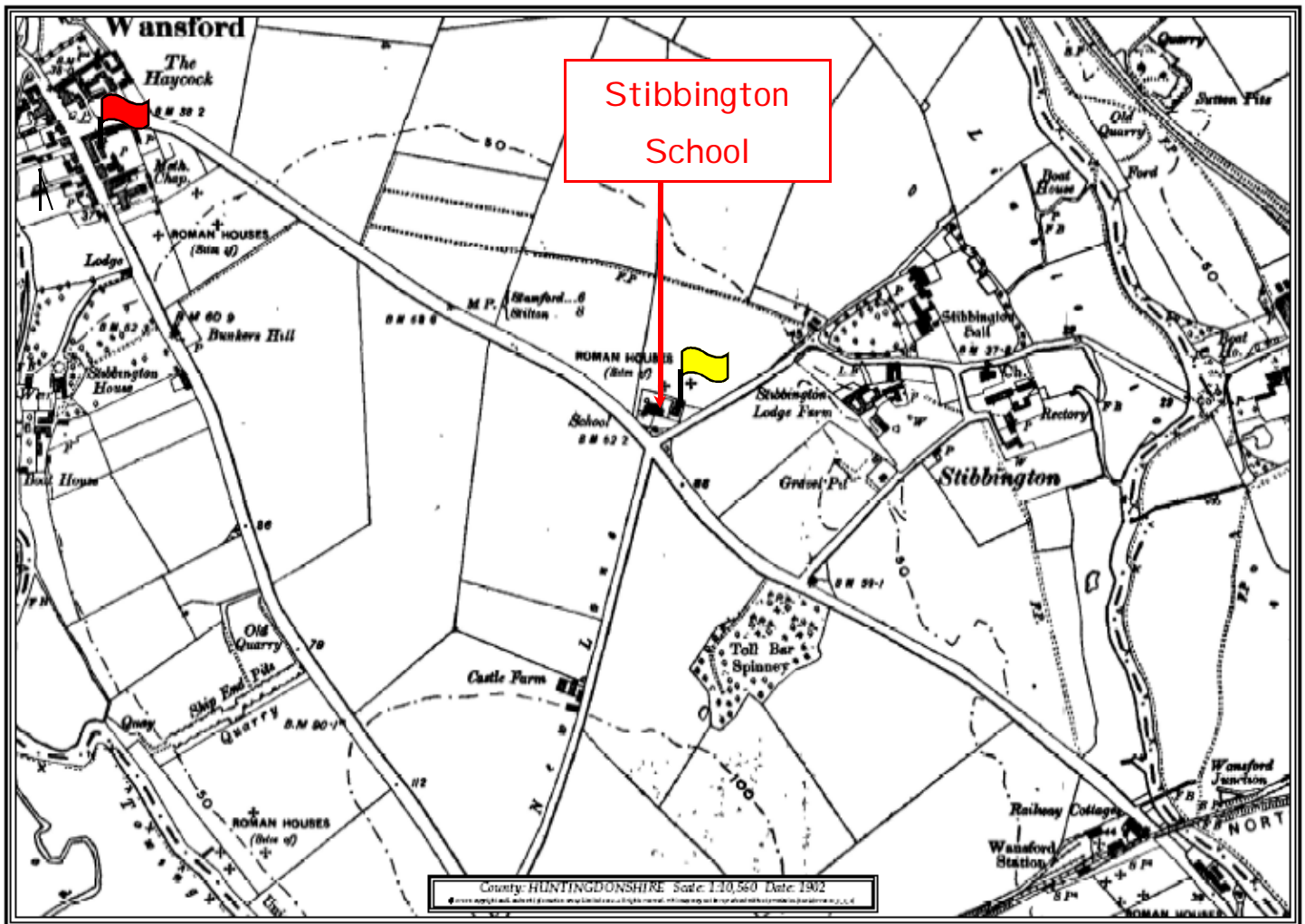
Gertrude worked as a monitress at Stibbington school from 1896 - 1900.

Her family lived in the nearby village of Helpston and her father, James Bloodworth, worked as a stonemason with J Thompson who worked on churches in the area. Her mother was Rebecca Wingrove.

During her time as a pupil at Stibbington School she lived with her uncle at the toy shop in Wansford. She boarded with the head teacher of Stibbington school during the week when she worked as a monitress.

After she left the school she became a housekeeper to a Methodist Minister in Peterborough.

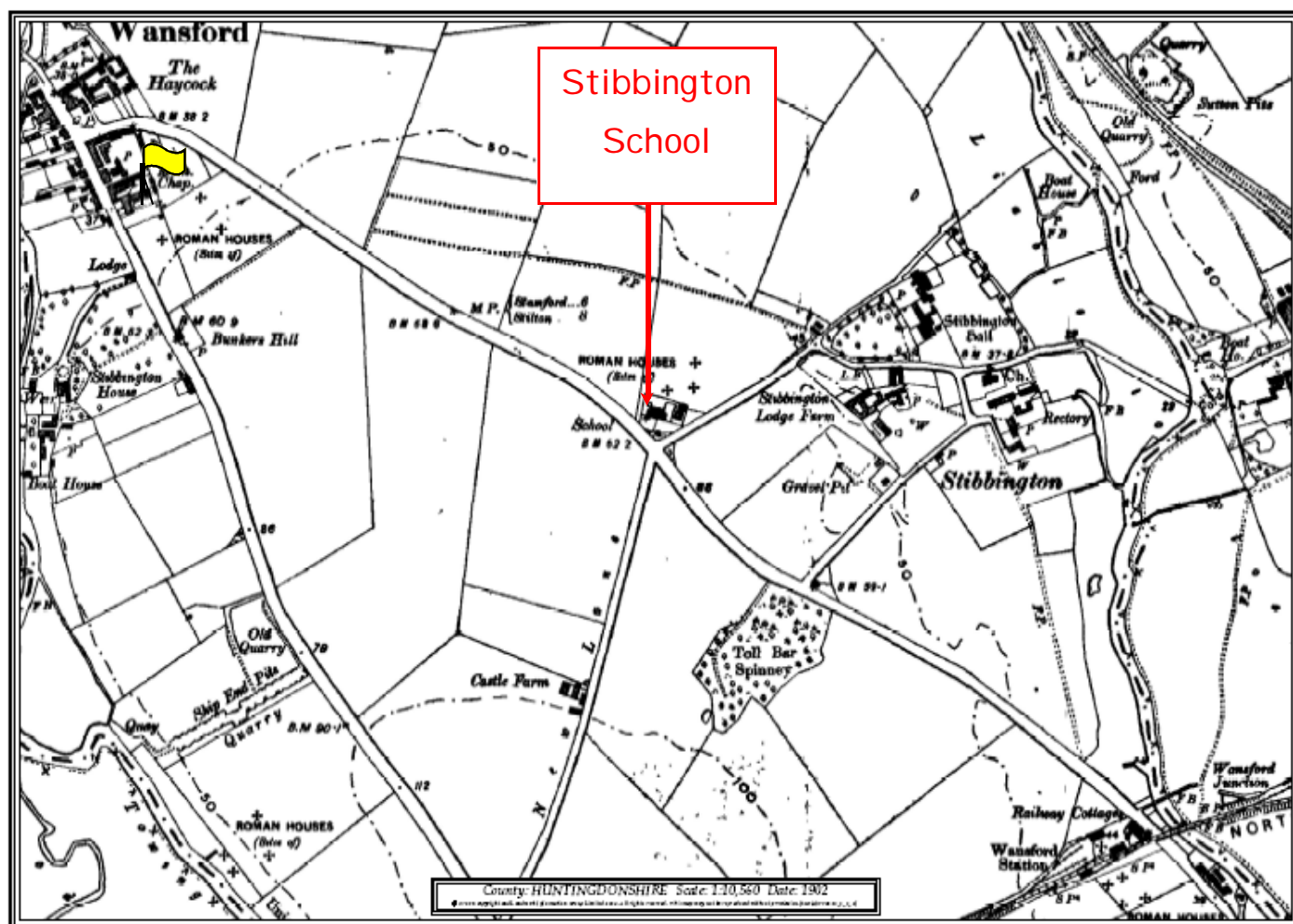
## Georgina Dorman in 1896


Georgina came from the nearby village of Wansford. Her father, George, was a postman and coffin maker and her mother was called Sarah Ann. Georgina had one brothers and three sisters (See table).

Georgina was a pupil teacher at Stibbington School until 1902. She received extra lessons before and after school to prepare for exams.

Georgina almost failed her second exam because her writing, singing and needlework were poor. She became assistant mistress at the British school in Peterborough on 28 February 1902. Eventually she married Mr Pasco and lived in Wansford. They had no children.

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## The Eassom Family in 1896

The Eassom family lived in the Cottage, Wansford. Their father, William was a woodman labourer. Their mother was called Martha and was a housewife.

Four boys attended Stibbington school in 1896.( See table).

George is mentioned in the log book as being disobedient and was caned several times for swearing. He married Ethel Kisbee.They had no children.

Arthur was killed in the First World War and is mentioned on the War Memorial in Stibbington Church.

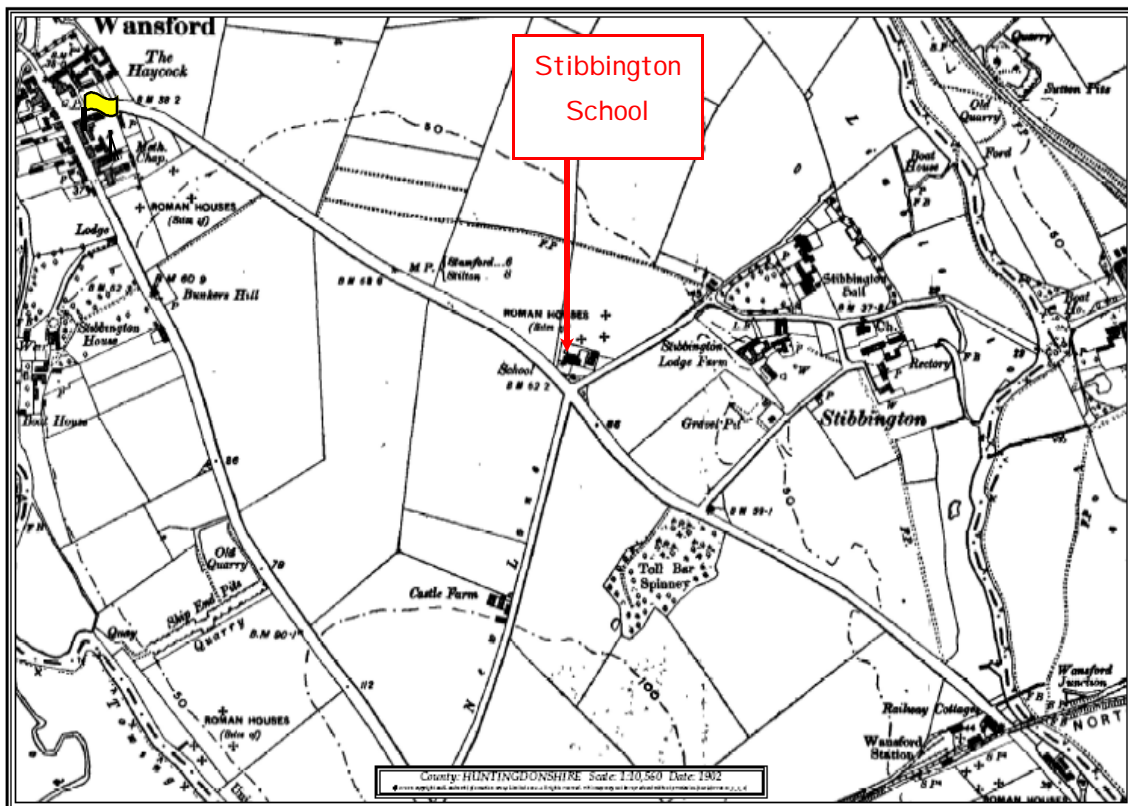
Albert lost a leg in the war. He married Frances and they had a son Frank.


There were two more brothers John (15) and Robert (3) neither of whom went to school in 1896.

The children's cousin Alice stayed with her aunt and uncle in 1896 and so attended Stibbington school with her cousins. Alice's father, John and mother, Sarah, lived in Kettering. (Alice's brothers and sisters are listed below Alice in the table.)

After leaving school Alice returned to Kettering and became a servant.

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## The Hazelby Family in 1896

The Hazelby family lived at the Wheelwright's Shop, Wansford. Isaac Hazelby, their father, was a wheelwright and later became school caretaker and Emma, their mother, was a housewife.

There were five children: ( See table).

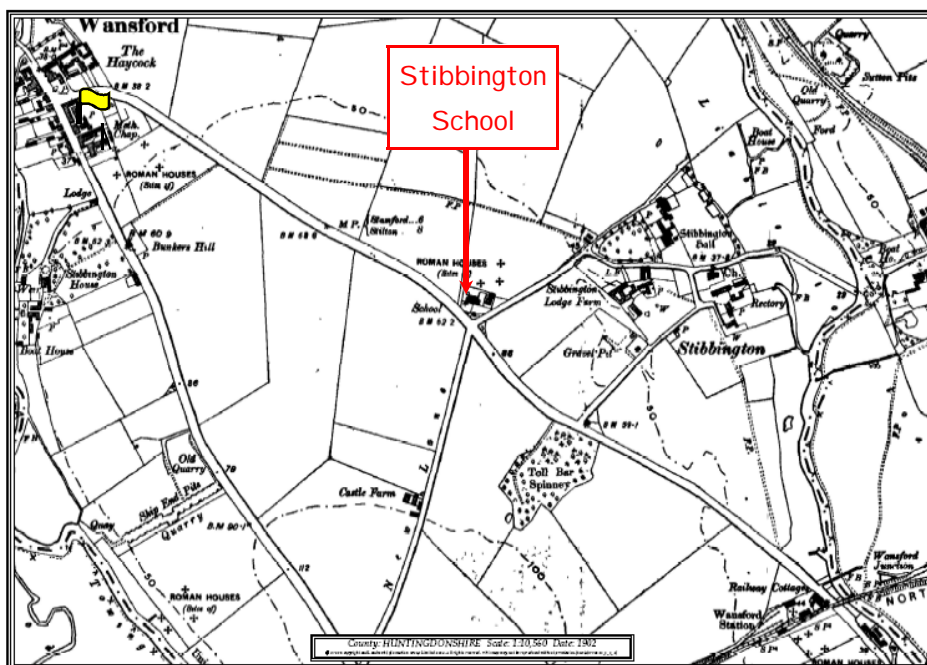
The oldest three attended Stibbington School in 1896. When they left school both boys worked on a farm but later joined the army. Sadly they were both killed in the First World War in 1917 and were buried in France. Emma went into service. She married Arthur Cox in 1917 but he was killed a few months later. In 1919 Emma married Arthur Hull, a baker. They had one daughter, Sybil.


Mary also went into service. She married William Bowdrey in 1911 and they had three children, Biddy, Babs and William. They moved away from the area to Oxford.

The Hazelbys' great grandparents lived in the School House, Stibbington. They were Thomas who was a carpenter and the school caretaker and Sarah, his wife.

Great Uncle William lived with them and was a clay pipe maker and a 'blind postman' . who collected the post for Captain Vipan .

The Liquorish family lived at 'The Tap' in Wansford. It was called this because it was a small pub.

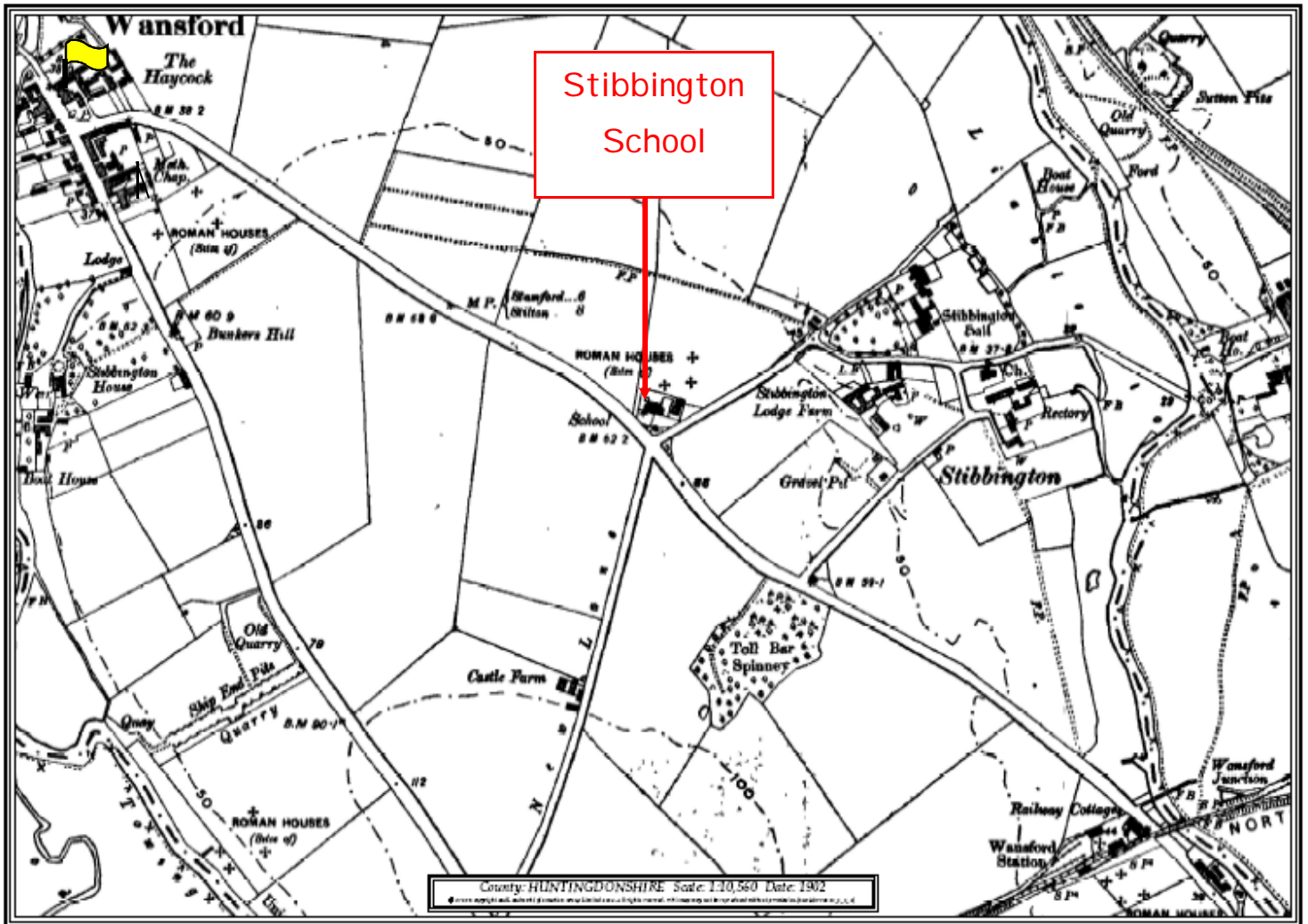
Their father, Arthur, was a groom and their mother, Mary Elizabeth, was a housewife.

School records state that in 1902 Ida was chosen to be the village's May queen..

The Mason family lived at Station Cottage next to Wansford Railway station.

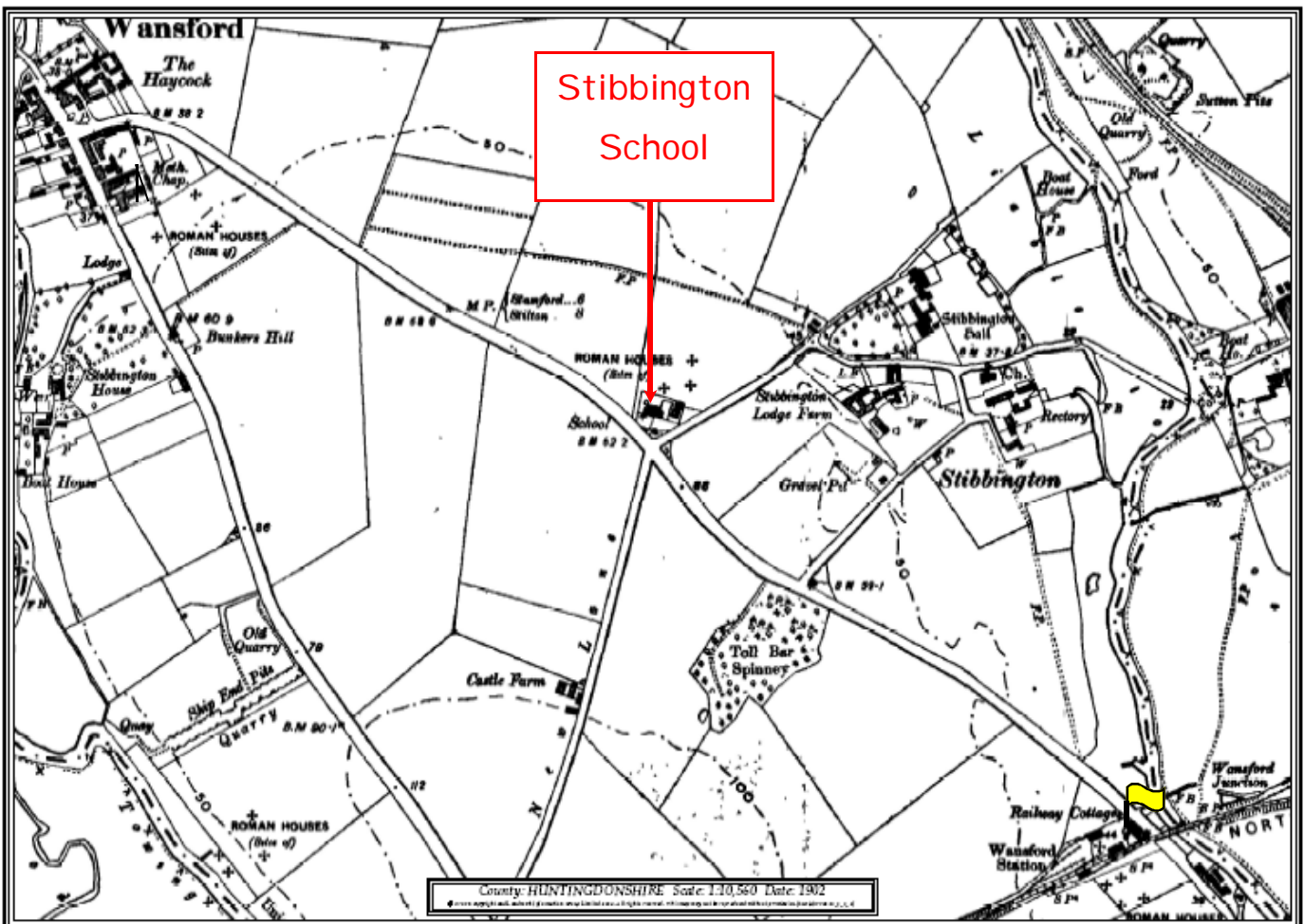
Their father, Charles, was a railway labourer and their mother, Rebecca, was a housewife.

Their father, Arthur, was a coachman and their mother, Ellen, was a housewife. There were four children:( See table)  
Marjory Jane died of a disease in 1887.

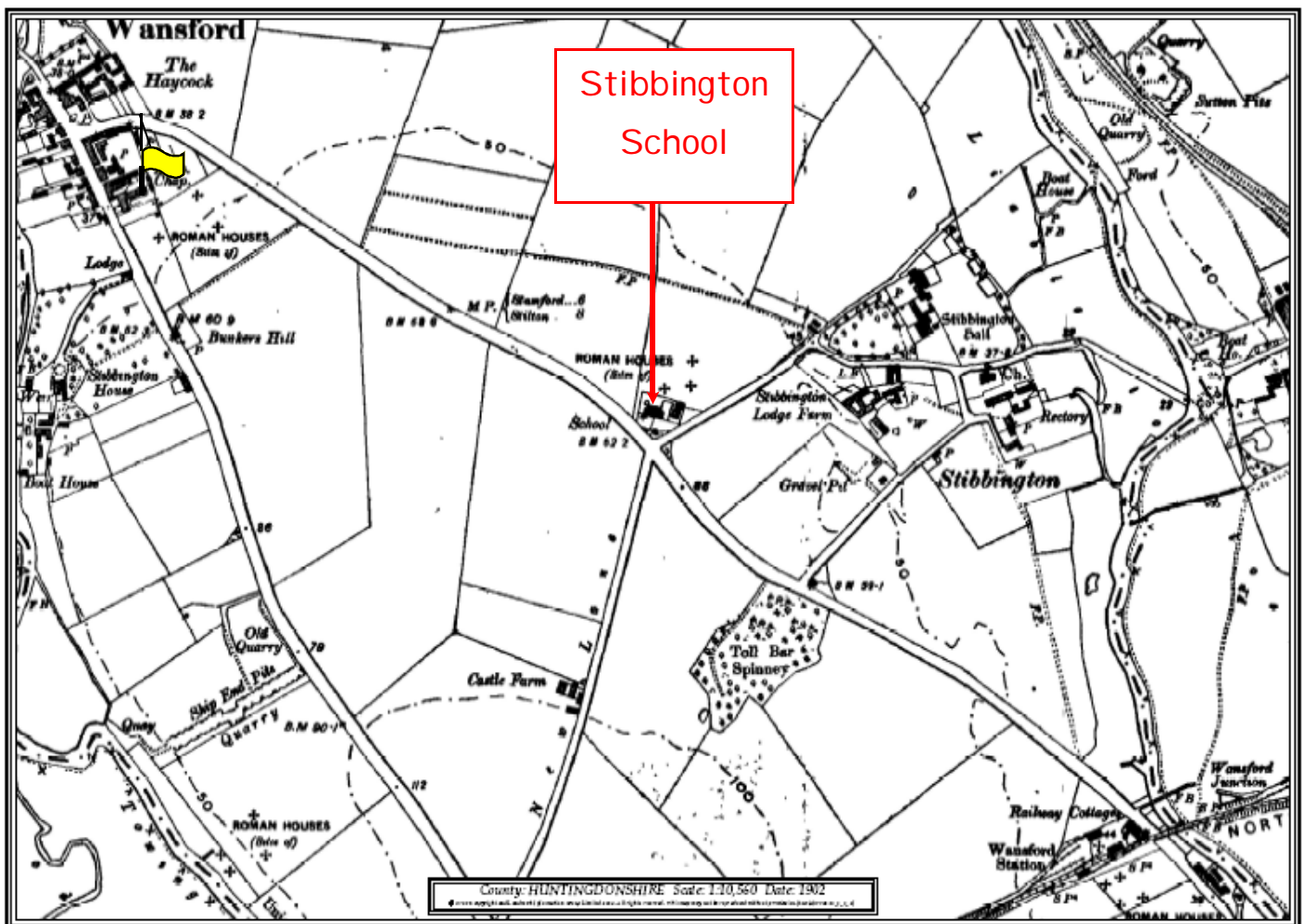
Between 1891 and 1901 the family moved into Stonewell Cottage.


Alice Maude was a monitress at the school and a May Queen in 1902. She became monitress in 1900 and subsequently a pupil teacher but failed the exam to become a qualified teacher in 1902. She married George Billows in 1908 and had a girl, Sybil, in 1909.

Alfred became a pony boy for his father

Ethel went into service and probably moved away.

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# The Smart Family in 1896

The Smart family lived in Stonewell Cottage, Stibbington.

Their father, Thomas was a labourer and their mother, Fanny, was a housewife.

There were nine children:( See table).

John caught typhoid fever in 1895 when the River Nene flooded into the well in the back garden. Fortunately he recovered.

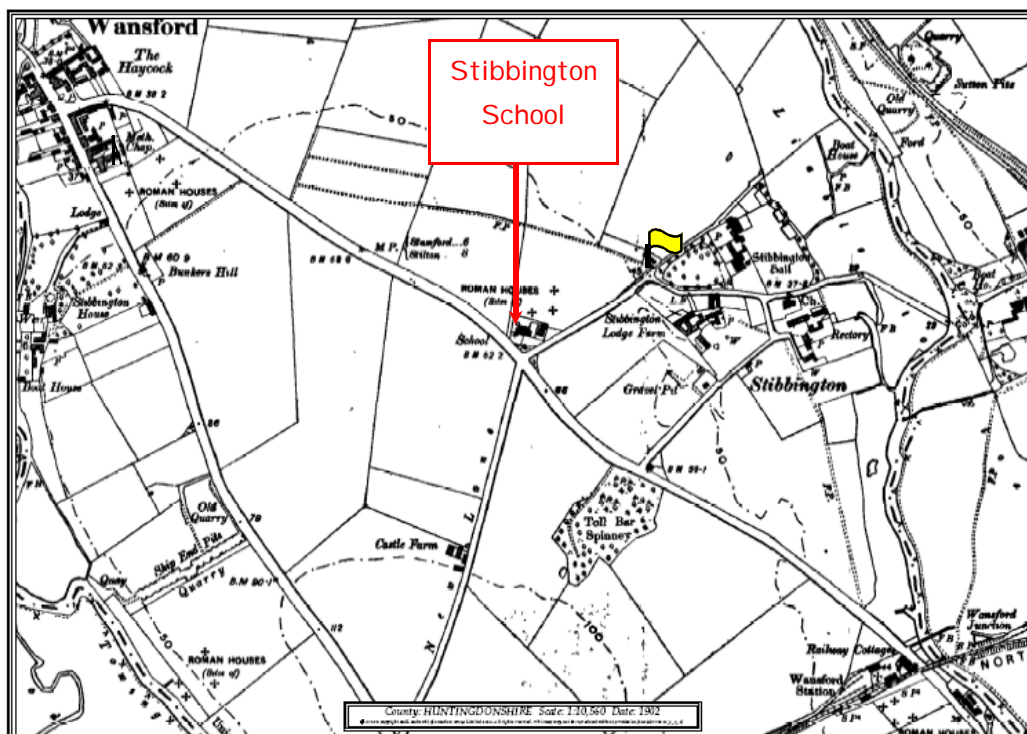
John became a farm labourer and in 1904 married Alice Mary Rippon. They had two children. Charles who was born in 1904 but died aged nine and William who was born in 1907.


Edith became a servant and later married George Redland.

Charles initially became a farm labourer but later joined the army. When he returned from the war he went to work on the railways at Rugby.

Alice was chosen as May Queen in 1905. When she left school she went into service but died young aged 25 and was buried in Stibbington graveyard (her grave is not marked)

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## The Sutton Family in 1896

The Sutton family lived in a cottage in Wansford.

Their father, John, was a farm labourer. John married twice. His first wife, Sarah Ann, mother to Alice and Charles, died in 1889.

John's second wife was called Eleanor and was mother to Arthur, Martin and Harold. There were eight children: (See table).

In 1896 the school aged children lived with their grandparents Edward and Ann and Aunt Alice in Stonewell Cottage, Stibbington, during the week.

When Alice left school in 1898 she went to look after her grandparents in Stonewell Cottage as by now they were quite elderly.

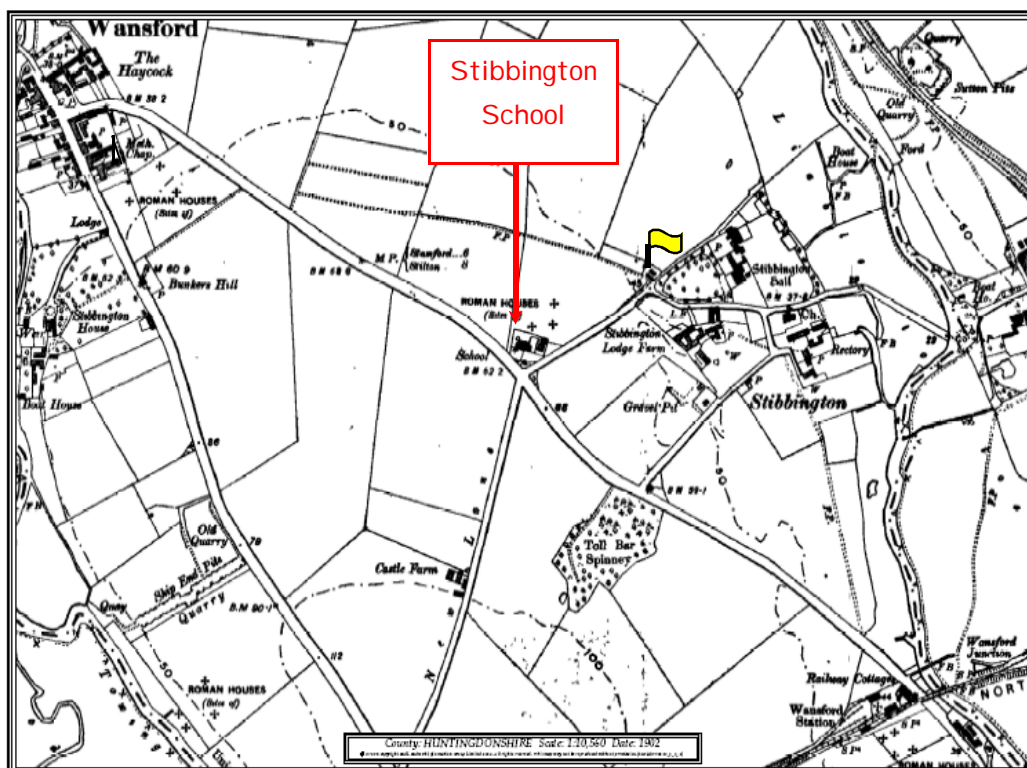
By 1901, mother and father, John and Eleanor, and the four youngest children had moved into Stonewell Cottage as Edward and Ann had died.

After her grandparents died Alice went to work as a general servant to the local farmer at Sibson, George Peliner.

Charles went to work on a farm.

Arthur followed in his grandfather Edward's footsteps and became a gamekeeper.

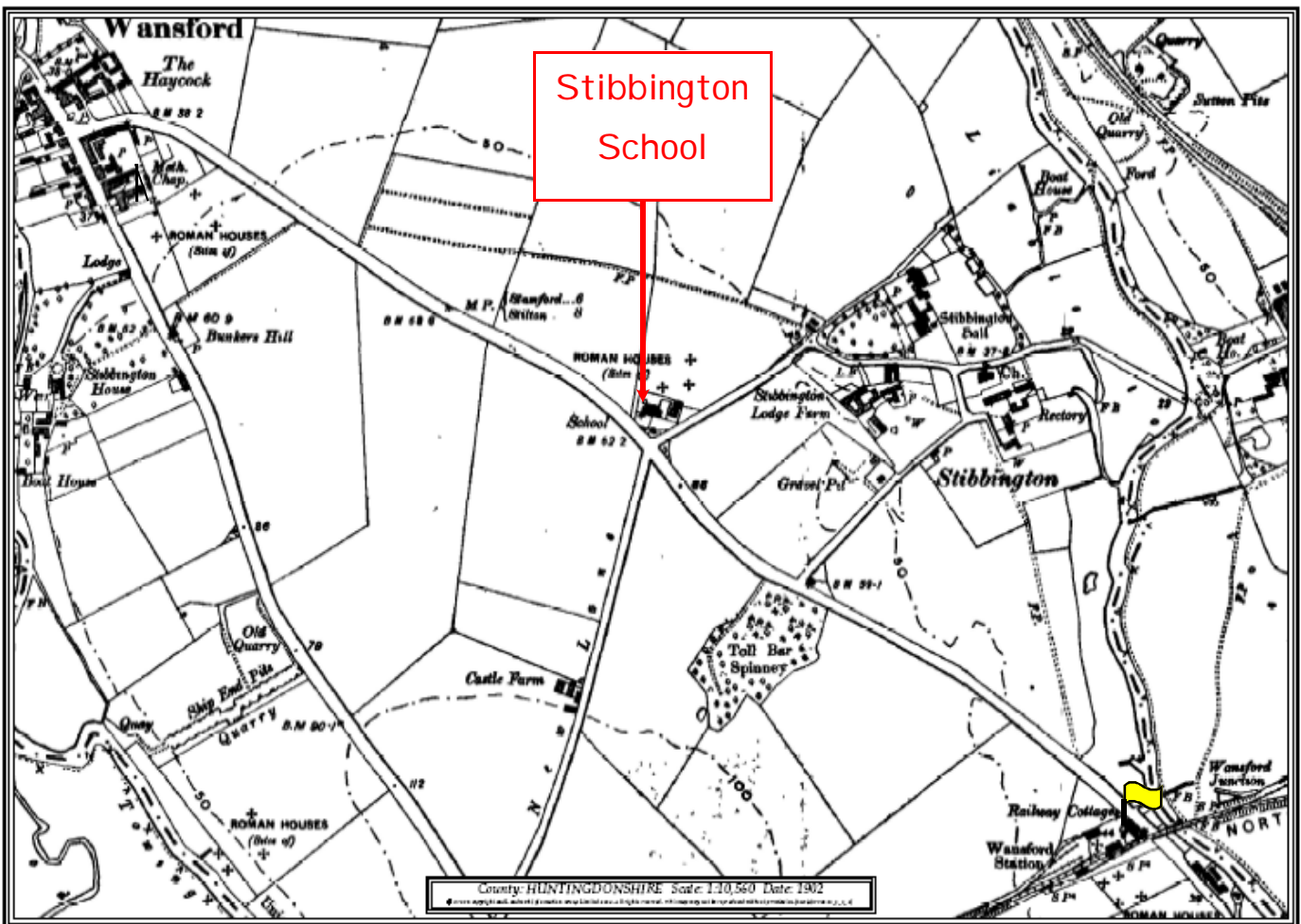


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# The Waite Family in 1896

The Waite family lived at Station Cottage. Their father, George, was a railway labourer and their mother, Annie, was a housewife. There were four children: (See table) William became a railway porter but died in Peterborough Infirmary of appendicitis aged twenty. Annie Elizabeth died of cancer in 1901 aged thirteen Her grave is in Stibbington graveyard. Nellie was chosen as May Queen in 1903.

# The Wingrove Family in 1896

The Wingrove family lived in the Butcher's shop in Wansford.

Their father, Henry, was a butcher and their mother, Mary, was a housewife.

There were seven children: ( See table).

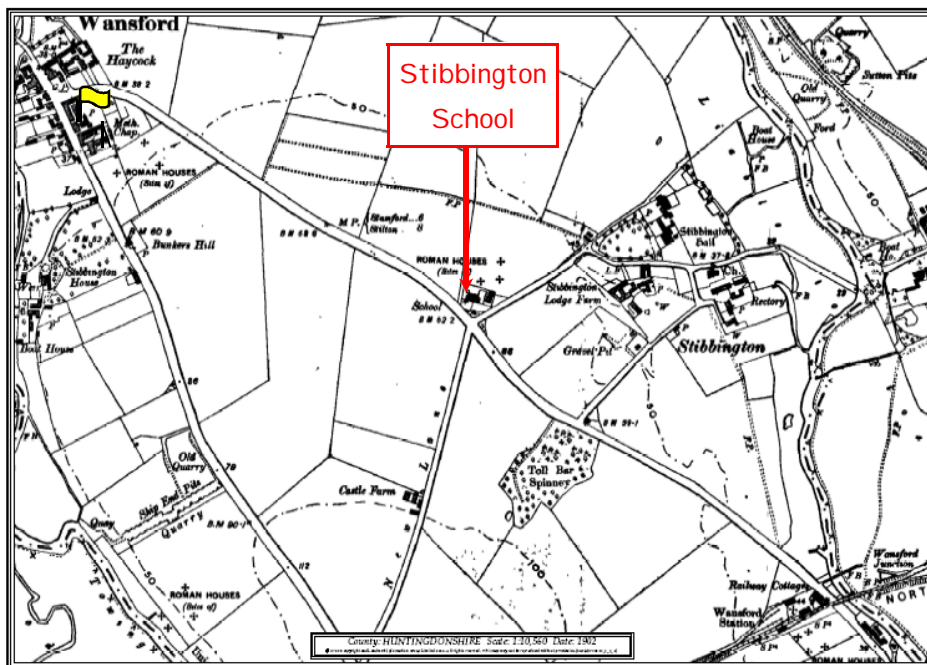
Charles initially trained as a carpenter but when Harry died took over the running of the Butcher's shop. He married Ada Dickenson in 1907 and they had ten children, four boys and six girls.


Bessie Mary died aged 16 months. Her grave is in Stibbington graveyard. Their two sons Harold and George were still the village butchers in 1992.

Emma became a servant and married Lester Gilbert in 1912, a rich engineer, who built a large three storey house and had servants. They had no children.

Ellen after being chosen as May Queen in 1904 became a monitress. She married Noel Turnill in 1916 but a few months later he was killed in the First World War. He is remembered on the war memorial in Stibbington church. Ellen did not remarry.

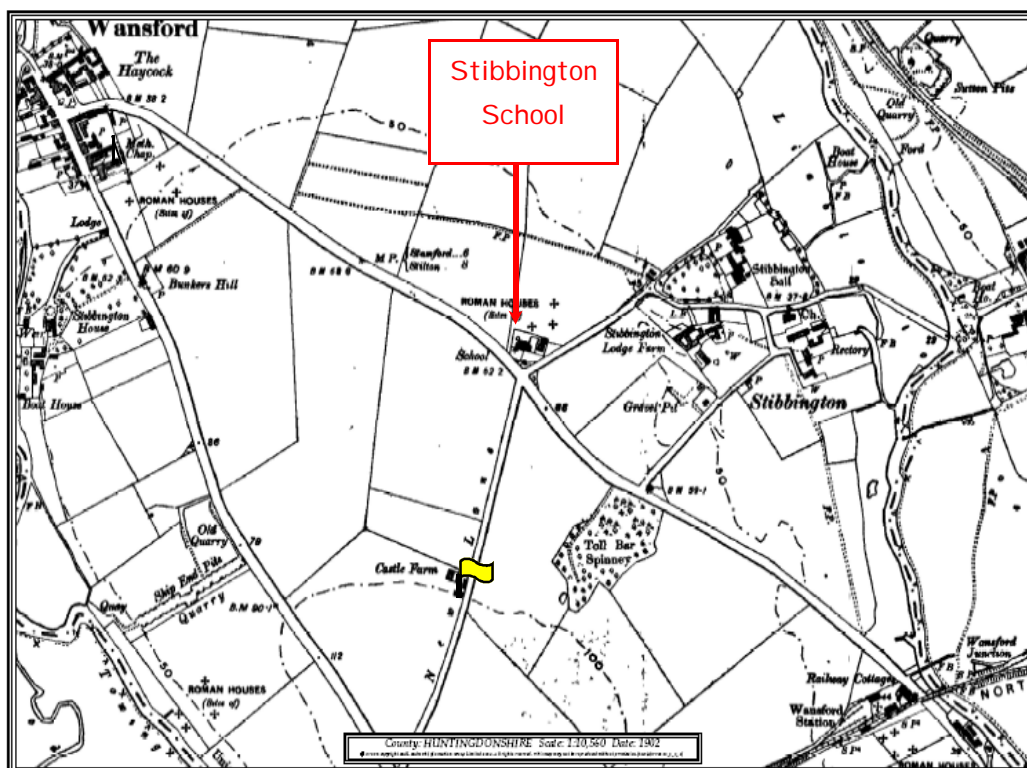


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# The Woodward Family in 1896

She married Robert Knight, a platelayer on the railway in 1910. They had three children: Olive Mary (1911), Robert Arthur (1913) and Walter Victor (1919). George became a farm labourer and then later became the chauffeur for Lord Burghley at Stamford and drove a Rolls Royce. Harry went to the College School, Peterborough
